STATEMENT OF: William F. Evans, 2nd Lt., 0-694353, Navigator.

We were flying along with the formation about nine o'flock at about nine thousand feet. The formation entered the clouds and we leveled off. We were in the clouds only a few minutes when the ship swerved violently to the left. I thought the pilot saw another wing tip and was trying to avoid it. We then swerved more violently to the right. I then figured the plane was out of control and thought that the plane had broken in two. I had my chute on before this. The last I saw of the bombadier, he was trying to put his chute on. We were going straight down, and the engines were all running very fast. There did not appear to be any fire in the wings. I tried to get to the escape hatch, but everything at this point is very confused and I do not knew if I got out this way. I remember looking down to see if my chute was on, and noting that it was backwards. It opened with some help from me and a moment later I hit the ground. I looked around to see the plane coming down, the tail part landed way behind the ship and numbers of burning pieces were falling around. There was a farmer near and I tried to walk over to him, but I was feeling pretty shaky. He got a car and took me to the hospital. I didn't feel any explosions and no alarm was given.

4-7/10 stratocumulus base 2000 ft top 4-6000 ft and 5-7/10 altocumulus base at 10000 ft. Visibility out of the clouds unlimited. Light rime icing in clouds above 5500 ft.
