TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

In regards to your letter of 17 May 50 there is very little information that I can give you as to the burial of the two members of my crew, namely 2nd Lt Edward Norton and 5/Sgt Harrison Kegg. My supposition is that their bodies, unless washed ashore later, are still in the ship in the North Sea.

We were shot down off the coast of Holland 17 May 43 on our return from a bombing mission on Imuiden Holland. As far as I know, either personally or from other survivors of my squadron, I was the only member of my crew picked up that day from the North Sea. The fishing boat that rescued me circled for several hours in an attempt to find other members of my crew. They managed to find an inflated life raft but that was all. I firmly believe that the rest of my crew went down with our ship.

I am sorry not to be able to give you any more complete information but will answer any more questions that might arise as to help you in any way shape or form.

SYMOPSIS: Missing Air crew Report # 5650 discloses that subject decedents and four other crew members comprised the crew of aircraft B-26 # 41-18090, which departed from England on 17 May 1943, on a bombing mission to Ijmeiden, Holland. No other details are contained in the Crew Report regarding the loss of the plane. German Dulag Records AV 121/43, AV 179/43 and AV 331/43 report that remains of A.K. Zeidenfeld, James A. Norton Jr and Ralph H. MacDougall, respectively, were washed ashore from the North Sea. These remains were recovered by U.S. Teams, evacuated to US Military Cemotery, Margraten, Holland where identifications were verified. One crew member of the subject aircraft was rescued from the North Sea, and records on file this headquarters reveal that he was returned to rilitary control. It is logical to conclude that 2nd Lt Edward R. Norton and S/Sgt Harrison E. Kegg were killed when their aircraft crashed in the North Sea in the vicinity of Ijmeiden, Holland on 17 May 1943, and their remains have not, to date, washed ashore and have not been recovered. The fact that of the unknowns recovered from the North Sea, none may be associated with the subject decedents, would tend to substantiats this conclusion. It is, therefore,

recommended that this case be deemed Non-Recoverable.

1. The following-named personnel of the Air Corps were reported missing in action over Holland on 17 May 1945, while in flying pay status, and were presumed dead under the provisions of Section 5 of the Missing Persons Act. (See SPAD Case Number 810):

2. In addition to the above persons, the following-nemed were also on the same plane, comprising a crew of six:

Sgt	Ralph H. McDougall	11037593	KIA

Of the entire crew, only one person, Sergeant Longworth, survived. Ho record is found in this office or in the Hissing Air Crew Report Fumber 5650, relative to the circumstances surrounding the loss of the aircraft or the details concerning his survival.

- 3. Missing Air Crew Report Humber 5650 discloses that subject persons and four others comprised the crew of 3-26 aircraft number 41-18090, which departed from England on 17 May 1945, on a bombing mission to Ijmuiden, Holland. No other details are contained in the Crew Report regarding the loss of the plane. Information contained in SR&D Review Humber 810 reveals that eleven 1-26 type aircraft departed from an English base on 17 May 1946 on this mission for the purpose of attacking power stations at Ijmuiden and Macriem, Holland. The first flight was to attack Ijmuiden with six planes, the second Haarlem with five planes. One plane of the second flight returned to base when its electrical system failed about 35 miles from the Dutch coast. Hone of the amaining ten aircraft returned from this mission.
- 4. Captured German records on file in this office disclose that the bodies of the three crew members shown as KIA were recovered at various times and places in the North Sea, along the western coast of Holland.
 - a. AT 121/43 (Item 16) of Cerman records reads as follows:

"4 June 1943 A. K. ZEIDE PELD, ASN 0-682530 E 42 1 dead body of amer. Flyer washed ashore near Callantscog".

Interred on 8 August 1943 1700, at Petten Cemetery, with military honors. Grave To. 169, right.

As can be seen from examination of the German records (1964) above, the first body was recovered from the North Sea at Callantsoog, Miliard, 22 miles north of the target area on 4 June 1968, the second at Den Holder, Holland, 36 miles much of the target area on 25 July 1943, and the third at Petten, Holland, 23 miles north of the target area on 8 August 1943.

5. The fact that the three bodies which were recovered and identified by the Germans were washed ashore along the west coast of Holland, clearly indicates the place of crash to be the North Sea. Therefore, it is logical to conclude that subject persons also came down in the North Sea. It is known that the waters of this sea are so cold in May as to permit continued life for only a few hours, unless life-saving equipment, such as rafts or dinghies are used. It appears that the bodies of subject persons were never recovered.

or, if recovered, were among the many unknown dead who are shown by captured German records to have washed ashore in that general area during the succeeding weeks. In this connection, it may be stated that a report received from the Hemorial Division of the Office of The Quarternaster General, Mashington, D. C., states that efforts to identify unknown dead in the area where subject plane is believed to have crashed, with the persons listed in paragraph 1, above, have proved unsuccessful to date.

6. It is recommended, therefore, that pursuant to the authority contained in Section 9 of the Missing Persons Act, the foregoing information be accepted as an official report of death and that casualty reports be initiated stating that the persons named in paragraph 1, above, were killed in action on 17 May 1943, while in flying pay status, in the North Sea, and that systemats be processed in accordance with paragraph 26, Operations Bulletin 35, 1965. The casualty report and official report of death in each case will include the following statement:

Finding of Death has been issued previously under Section 5, Hissing Persons Act, showing presumed date of death as 18 May 1944. This "Report of Death" is issued in accordance with Section 9 of said Act and its effect on prior payments and settlements is as prescribed in Section ?.





If any damage to the shipment is noticed upon delivery, please make notation of such damage on the reverse of the Original bill of lading, under the caption, "Report of Loss, Damage or Shrinkage", and place your signature after the notation. The agent of the delivering carrier should be requested to make appropriate notation on the freight bill of such damage. Any adjustment or claim you may desire to present because of damage must be handled between you and the agent of the delivering carrier.

The Property Received copy of the bill of lading may be retained or discarded by you,

At the present time, a great amount of freight is being handled by common carriers and delivery of this shipment may be delayed. However, if the shipment is not received within a reasonable length of time, you may notify this Bureau, so that tracer action can be instituted here.

Dear Doctor:

I am pleased that you forwarded me the letter from Great Britain relative to holding effects for six months in that Theatre of Operations. Frankly, we did not know definitely that this was being done although in certain cases such action, in our opinion, might be justified, for example, some airmen who go down over Europe in a matter of weeks or a few months have been able to return through the Underground, hence it is desirable that their property be retained in Great Britain for direct return to these men.

I assure you that had this Bureau known of the withholding of your sons' property we most certainly would have so advised you. You may quite properly say "we should have known it" and I would agree. Due to our inability to get such information, a representative from this Bureau is shortly going to the United Kingdom.

To date, we have received the sums of money mentioned in Major Chayes' letter. Checks and receipts which we require are inclosed. The balance of the effects are in transit to us by transport and rail; the money came to us by mail. I assure you that immediately after the property is received here, I'll expedite it on to you.

I recognize that this matter has taxed your patience to the limit. Mine likewise would be so taxed were I in your position.

Few families in our country have sustained such a loss as you and Mrs. Norton have sustained. To you I extend my deepest sympathy.
